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FROM THE COMMODORE

A short update ...

A small subcommittee has been working on a **Long Term Plan** with a draft now before the main Committee. The subcommittee recommends the plan remain confidential to the Committee given the commercial sensitivity of material explored. That said, we'd welcome hearing your ideas, concerns or other input to the plan. Just share this input with someone in the Committee.

Patrol 1 replacement; After considering the options the Committee has decided to progress towards a Mac570 fisher. This is a rotational moulded open pontoon boat. An alloy pontoon would have been preferred but would be a one-off that no manufacturers are prepared to take on. We also considered two Naiad options but were put off by the price and recommended foam-filled pontoon replacement regime.

Next steps; the boat is being quoted with supplier-fitted equipment. We will then get competitive quotes for remaining equipment and begin to work on funding.

Information Systems:

Having tidied up the website, Warrick has now also set up cloud-based storage for documents to be saved centrally. This is to help retain important club documents and to ensure they are available to future management (committees) of the day and to support these documents to be worked on collaboratively.

What is it about sailing that you like?


